At first glance, Pantone's Color of the Year 2023, which was announced last week. is for those with a fearless approach to design. The electrifying "Viva Magenta" (18-1750) is a dynamic red tone showing little restraint. While this intense shade undoubtedly grabs attention, it's also inspiring.

"Viva Magenta is a powerful and unexpected color that I often use throughout my designs when I want to create an uplifting environment," said designer Anne Hepfer, an interior designer in Toronto. "When a color like this is accented in a space, your eye immediately goes to that impactful color which packs a punch. I think it will put a smile on many faces as it just feels happy."

To determine the best application for this expressive color, Mansion Global asked a group of designers to weigh in. Here's what they said about Viva Magenta, Pantone's Color of the Year 2023.

## Introduce Magenta-Colored Accessories

"It is a great color for accessories, such as lamp shades and pillow trim. It goes with the crispness of white, as well as lighter shades of blue and green. Magenta flowers in a white vase placed on a magenta colored table would be pretty. Magenta table linens and candles would add striking elements to a table setting."

"I wouldn't use a flat finish for this color; go with a shiny or lacquered finish. Lacquering a vintage Queen Anne chair in magenta and then adding a fun fabric for the upholstery would also be a great option."
